Queens County Fiddlers record new CD!

Launch set for April 29 in Charlottetown

Walking into Park Royal United Church on Feb. 25 was a bit like walking into your living room on Christmas morning. We'd all circled this day on our calendars. Just like Christmas, the lead-up was hectic –

endless preparations and attention to the smallest of details. We also had to get as many members of the "family" there as possible, along with few special guests. Many of us were even "counting the sleeps", eager for all the excitement to begin.

But, unlike Christmas, there were no wrappedup presents under a glittery tree. What the members of the Queens County Fid-

dlers were so eager to tear into was the gift of music and the chance to create our very own CD.

And over the next seven hours — after setup, tunings, recordings, do-overs, do-overs again, last-minute alterations, chit-chat, food, feedback, laughs and the love of our music — that's just what we did.

"To bring a group of our size together, consisting of various age levels and playing skills, and create something truly amazing shows the dedication and cohesiveness of what I like to call our big fiddle family," said Queens County Fiddlers (QCF)

president Tammy MacEachern. "To the silent players, such as family, friends, supporters and professionals, there would be no QCF without them. Strong leadership, dedication to the tradition and hard work have

proven what we can create together."

The "hard work" started in the fall when the group decided it was time another CD. Once there was a commitment, music director Aaron Crane set about selecting music. With some input from the group, he chose tunes we'd been playing, for the most part, over the past five years. Some sets were selected "as is", while others were broken apart to add new

selections. The result was 14 sets, jam-packed with traditional tunes, great music from Cape Breton tunesmiths and as many Island-made tunes as possible, including compositions from Marlene Gallant, Kevin Chaisson, Val Reddin and Aaron himself.

"To have a piece of music that is going to be part of something forever is a feeling I can't really describe," Marlene said with a smile. "It makes my heart happy."

After our Christmas break, Aaron had Marsha McCormick begin scouting churches in Charlotte-

town, with Park Royal United eventually chosen. Meanwhile, he used his own knowledge of P.E.I.'s music industry to select Adam Gallant as our sound engineer. With Feb. 25-26 selected as the dates, reality set in that this was actually going to happen.

In the five Wednesday night practices leading up to the recording, we put the finishing touches on our music. For 90 minutes, Park Royal United Church we played, concentrated, listened, made little changes, worked on beginnings, smoothed out transitions, perfected endings and took

our work home with us where we practised some more to do it all again the next week.

Was it hard work? Yes.

Was it fun? You bet.

And that's what Aaron was all about. With different ages and levels -all eager to do their best he told us over and over that while we had to be ready, the process was meant, above all, to be fun.

"And in order to do that, everyone had to prepare in their own way. Folks had to practise more, I had to be more organized — and in doing these things in advance it allowed us to actually enjoy the day instead of stressing."

That attitude went a long way toward getting an excited but not-too-stressed-out group of musicians to Park Royal on recording day. With much of

the set-up done, including positioning mics and chairs and getting Adam's portable studio established in a small adjacent room, all that remained was to hand over our fiddles to Vince Keoughan and Father Charlie Cheverie for tuning and find our places to sit.

As noon approached, 30 fiddlers, three guitarists and Jennifer Garrity on piano were ready. We ripped into a test set of jigs – just to settle the nerves – and then we were good to go.

"Recording day was a blast!" said Marsha McCormick. "We were all up for the event and right from the first tune I knew we were going to be fine."

Over the next six hours, the sets just kept rolling: the Jigs in D, the Tennessee Waltz, the Paddy LeBlanc set, Inisheer, the Lime Hill set, the Sinnie's Jig set and The Lover's Waltz. Aaron was always positive, even when inevitable mistakes were made (it's a challenge for 34 musicians to be absolutely silent for about three seconds at the end of a rollicking set of reels).

And Adam was a gem. With a great ear for music, he could tell if something didn't sound quite right, and with his input and Aaron's, everyone seemed to be in tune with the whole process.

"For the recording session in itself, it was well organized, there was no pressure on us, he knew how he wanted each cut to sound and we worked together until they came out right," said Lorraine McMillan about Aaron's effort.

to be in control of a whole bunch like that," added Lorraine Lynch, an Islander who has lived in the Boston area since the 1950s but is a summertime member of the QCF and made the trip to P.E.I. to be part of the recording. "The whole scenario, to me, was just wonderful. It was the thrill of a lifetime. It was something I wouldn't miss and didn't want to miss."

The day was not all work and no play. There were breaks to keep us loose and have a chat.

"It was lovely to have the time to have conversations with the fiddlers and just spend the day with everyone — getting caught up and getting to

know some of them a little better," said Linda Moran.

As we checked off set after set, it became clear we might be able to do the whole recording in one day, even though people were getting a little tired. And then we came up against a wall with Jerry Holland's marvelous slow air, Lonesome Eyes. I'm not sure how many takes were started and stopped — 15 seconds in, 30 seconds in, a minute in. With Aaron on piano, Cailyn MacAulay on solo fiddle for the beginning and the end of the tune and everyone else (along with harmony), we couldn't seem to make magic happen.

Finally, Aaron literally changed speeds and got Jennifer back on the piano. He took a little break, and the group ripped off two sets of reels, finishing with the Flowers of Edinburgh set.

Maybe the familiar, friendly notes, not to mention the pace, helped clear the late-day cobwebs because our next attempts at Lonesome Eyes finally began to do it justice. And with a little bit of floor directing from one of our guitarists, Julian Kitson, we finally got what we all wanted.

Our last act was to record some footstompin', clapping, hootin' and hollerin' for possible mixing into the finished recording.

After putting the church back in order for the next day's Sunday service, we were gone — leaving Adam and Aaron to work their magic that will result in our new CD — "Ages".

The name, in part, represents the group's wide range of fiddlers — from nine years old to 84 at the time of the recording.

"It was an exciting day," said Luka Hall, the youngest on the recording. "Now I know what it is like to make a CD!"

"When you have a goal to reach, it's a challenge for the group as a whole," added Father Charlie, the oldest. "To see the excitement of the young people with the ones who have been around for a while — the tradition is enlivened and enriched by their presence."
