The 2017 Spring season proved you just never know what's going to happen next, despite your best laid plans. For me it was a simple trip to

Ontario over Easter weekend for my birthday to visit my children, their spouses and my two little grand-daughters (aged 20 and 10 months). Such a cute age and growing so fast. What could go wrong

Well, a little slip on a step and down I went on the tops of both feet to break both the bones of both my legs. Well I always do a thorough job of

everything I endeavor and I guess that includes breaking my legs!

Surgery was done on the left leg on Easter Sunday in Brampton, ON. The blessing was returning to my room from surgery to find all my kids and grandkids present and waiting for the go ahead for me to share a birthday cupcake with them before the day was over. Our Easter dinner was cooked and brought in on Easter Monday and we

on Easter Monday and we had a roast chicken picnic dinner in my room. What a treat. The babies thought it was great fun as they were allowed to eat their supper on the bed with me. In other words, we all just made the best of an unfortunate incident. One we will remember forever.

It was hoped the right leg would heal on its own but the fracture shifted and started to heal wrong so when I got to Charlottetown the bone had to be re-broken and stabilized with a plate and pins putting it's healing about a week behind the left leg. Fortunately, I had purchased flight insurance and not being able to sit in a commercial seat, was flown home on a stretcher in comfort and style in a Leer Jet air ambulance. Following my surgery in Charlottetown, I was transferred to the Souris Hospital to

recover close to my hubby and friends and to receive excellent care from the staff and physio in my own community. And thanks to all the support and my usual determination, my recovery has been going extremely well.

I was offered the loan of a silent fiddle (an electric fiddle with no amp) to polish up my tunes. The Kitchen Group all came to the hospital where we took over the classroom downstairs for a rip-roaring practice. I then managed to get into a van with a ramp loaned to us by another member of the community and participated in our year end concert at Souris Regional School, which went off extremely

well.

Kathryn's students started off with some numbers that all the students learned. Then the first year students pressed everyone with how much they had learned in such a short time. The intermedistudents then ate played a couple of complicated more pieces that included some beautiful harmo-



Interview with Eileen (Butler) Rafferty by Dorothy Griffin-Farish

My grandmother, Mrs. Maurice Butler, nee Annie Griffin, who died in 1941 in Glengarry, Lot 7, P.E.I., was noted for a number of things - helping to clear the land on their farm and raising livestock and growing food for a growing family of two boys and four girls. When my grandfather Maurice died at an early age in 1927, Grammie, with the

help of her oldest son, carried on farming and lived in the home in Glengarry until her death. My father inherited the homestead and after he married and had a family, this was where my siblings and I grew up.

For years in the attic of the old farm house in Glengarry I noticed an old fiddle. My father never played it, so it remained untouched for years. Being curious, I wanted to

know more about who did play it and found out that Grammie Butler was the culprit. From reports I heard from others, Grammie was a fun-loving person who was always playing jokes on her children and who enjoyed music. She was reported to be a really good fiddler who played for all the parties in the community. She also could play the accordion and the jaw harp. Grammie's

grandparents, Maurice Griffin and his wife Ellen Reilly Griffin, came to the Lot 7 area from Ireland in the early 1800s. In those days if people had a musical bend they would certainly take their musical instruments with them if they moved to a new country. It seems that the violin that travelled with Maurice and Ellen from Ireland to Lot 7, Prince Edward Island was passed down the generations

7, Prince Edward Island was passed down the generations until it came to Grammie Butler. Even if the violin had been new when it came from Ireland, that would make it today around two hundred years old, but speculation is that the violin may be from 400 to 600 years old.

My husband Norbert plays the violin, and I love music, so in 1995, some time before my father died, I asked him if I

could have Grammie's old fiddle. Once it was mine, Norb and I got new strings for it, cleaned it up, and started playing it. Before that, the fiddle hadn't been played since Grammie herself had played it. The tone is rich and mellow and the fiddle looks fantastic. It is a treasured keepsake of my ancestors that is still making great music in the 21st century.
