
Summer was a long time coming this year and it seems it no sooner got here

She also had her finger in the Celtic Music by the Sea series held in late August at the Court House Theatre and Museum in St. Peter's Bay hosting such entertainers as Cape Breton fiddler Andrea Beaton, our own Chad Mooney and friends and the unique sound of western PEI musicians Jesse Francis on fiddle and vocals, lain MacInnes on ullieann pipes and whistle and Grady Poe on guitar.

31st Annual Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival

The Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival lived up to its reputation after over 30 years in the running. While Arrowsmith fans fought the rain, the mud, the cramped quarters and a limited view of the entertainers, devoted fiddle fans donned their rain gear and sported colourful umbrellas to take in the crème de la crème of Maritime fiddle music in the peaceful, green rolling hills of Rollo Bay, PEI. The cloud cover and the warm rain seemed to enhance the sound coming from the stage giving it a warm, rich tone. The quality of the performances was not in the least bit dimmed by the clouds.

From start to finish the festival was an event to be remembered. The Thursday night Rollo Bay ceilidh played before a packed house with all the anticipation of the weekend ahead. A sample of what was to come became evident when the young people began to appear on stage. Crowd pleaser, 8 year old Winsloe, PEI resident Liam McGlashon, stole the show with his lively repertoire and irresistible charm.

The fiddle workshops delivered by Anastasia Des-Roches and Ward MacDonald were as diverse as the fiddlers who taught them. Anastasia brought a collection of Acadian tunes written by well known fiddlers from Abrams Village and shared the techniques used in the Evangeline region. Ward focused on learning tunes "by ear", a method commonly used in the past when not much written music was to be found and most tunes were learned by listening to other fiddlers or from the radio.

The youth concert Friday night was a real thrill. MC Bennett Campbell was seen pacing the parking lot at 7:25 when Tim Chaisson arrived. "Finally a fiddler" he said. And the show began, on time at 7:30, and what a show it was. A real treat to see and hear was young Evangeline fiddler Karine Gallant, back from a two year stint in Quebec and some workshops in Sweden. She more than capably demonstrated some of the techniques she learned in her travels. Massachusets resident Emily Brashour was back this year and played a Jerry Holland tune she learned at the fiddle festival last year and dedicated it to Jerry.

Young Chrissy Crawley from Margaree, Cape Breton wowed the audience with some tunes from her newly released, self named CD. Talk about talent!! Mabou resident Allan Cameron showed off the progress he has made in one short year. The last half of the show was just a delight with Tim and JJ Chaisson accompanying each other, passing the fiddles and the guitars back and forth to each other with Kevin Chaisson accompanying on piano most of the time. The versatility of these young, seasoned entertainers is truly amazing and a joy to behold.



Most notable were the number of piano players available to assist with accompaniment. Along with the ever willing Kevin Chaisson there was Cape Bretoner Alan Dewar and New Brunswick native Jeff Matheson. Richard Wood played piano to Brenda Stubbert and Brenda played for Richard. What a performance!

Meanwhile, over in the tuning room there was no shortage of music or listeners both Saturday and Sunday. Ward MacDonald and Bonnie Campbell accompanied a variety of fiddlers on piano.


Queens County Fiddlers Report By Carolyn Drake



Musical performances by young and old were plentiful, joyful and enthusiastic this summer in the Evangeline region, with house parties, the Atlantic Fiddlers Jamboree, dinner theatres, "French Toast"-to name just a few. Here are some of the highlights.

A great many young people in this area are embracing the art of traditional violin playing, as well as step dancing and performing at dinner theatre productions. This is most encouraging! Two groups of young people who are making their mark in the Evangeline region are *Les Musimains* and *Les Tapageuses*.

Les Musimains is a group of five musicians, ranging in age from 12 to 16 years. Fiddle Shop Talk

The Sunday afternoon sessions at Brennan's are going very well with many players "from away" joining in and saying how pleased they are that a regular session is being held. The first half is a slow session with some music provided and the second half is by ear



and at regular tempo. These will continue Roy Johnstone once per month starting in October and

the Irish dance sessions should also be starting soon. Check the BUZZ for details.

Heading into the fall is a good time to reevaluate your fiddle playing and to plan out some activities that will help you move towards playing better. Self evaluation of your playing is a bit difficult at first but with some practice it will be very rewarding since it allows you to direct your own learning process. For example, consider your bowing; Can you play jigs smoothly with a strong rhythm? The drive and power of the jig comes from the bow arm and getting the lift in your playing will make a big difference in your sound. Practice playing the 6/8 rhythm of a jig; pay attention to the first eight note of each triplet. Plaving with as little muscular tension is key and transfer the accent gently through your bow hand. I find that most of the pressure is coming through my index finger to the

For any of the dance styles you can identify an area to work on. Strathspeys, the strong cuts for instance, the hornpipes, a lighter lift to the playing, airs, longer bows with more expression . Each player will have her own areas to work on. Don't choose too many or that will be self defeating. Choose a few areas and work on them daily for a few months and I'm sure you will see improvements.

Some players just concentrate on learning new tunes but this can be problematic if that's all you do. Often the tunes are not appropriate to your level of playing and you end up frustrated or worse: with a physical ailment from the stress. Having a good teacher to guide you can help (check out the list of fiddlers willing to teach) and I know of a few good books. Two that are more traditional are "Fiddle Tunes" by Robin Williamson and "Traditional Scottish fiddling, a player's guide". "Tools for musicianship" by Matt Glazer covers rhythm, advanced ear training, harmony and melodic development and composition (three CD's included).

This is one area where classical music has its' advantages. The program of learning is structured to take you through a series of exercises and tunes that help to evolve your playing sequentially. If you know of some good books that take a developmental approach to traditional music please e-mail me and I will mention them in the next shoptalk.

Enjoy and till next time keep your bow rosined and the fiddle in tune.

We'll take care of all your digging, trucking, sewer system, and landscaping needs them have informed me that the programs are continuing this year for Grades 4 to 9 and that a new student teacher will be looking to organize a string class at Charlottetown Rural. Jennifer Lalecheur is a music student at Memorial University and a string major, so she will be a great asset to Charlottetown's music scene. She hopes to do some private teaching and will be helping with the program at Stonepark as well. That is the good news. The bad news is that there is a possibility that the long-time string program at Lucy Maud Montgomery may be cancelled after this current school year. The string teachers are hoping to generate community support to save the string program there, and are planning to have a concert in May 2008 to raise funds for the programs and to increase awareness of the of the value of the string programs in the schools. We should note that although many of the teachers have a classical background, they do enjoy teaching a lot of fiddle music to their students. Good luck to them in their quest to keep ALL the string programs operational!

Fiddle Care The Fingerboard

The fingerboard is a part of the violin that also requires regular attention. It is made of ebony, which is a very hard and dense wood, but it will wear down with use. The fingerboard is shaped so that there is a

slight dip (called the "scoop") planed in it lengthwise--from the nut to the lower end. This is done to provide additional clearance for the strings and help prevent buzzing.

The fingerboard will gradually develop grooves worn by the strings and hollows where your fingers rest; these have to be planed out, after which the board is scraped and polished to a mirror smoothness. The length of time between planings can be anywhere from one year to several, depending on the density of the wood, the amount you play, and the abrasiveness of your perspiration. Good ebony is becoming very difficult to find, so it is a good idea to go as long as you can between planings. At some point the fingerboard will be too thin to plane anymore and will have to be replaced, but if the instrument you have purchased has a healthy one of good, dense wood, this should not be necessary for many years.

You might also keep in mind that making a proper fingerboard, and with it the neck, is one of the most difficult parts of setting up an instrument, and the one most often done poorly. The shape of the neck and fingerboard can have quite an effect on your perception of the instrument's response and ease of play. Many times the problems one encounters with the sound are actually due to the setup.




