An Afternoon with Jackie Biggar

Jackie Biggar was born and raised in Tyne Valley to a very musical family. Jackie's grandfather, the late Clifford Biggar, participated in the famous Fiddle Contest of 1926 and placed 4th in a class of 75 fiddlers from all over PEI. Jackie's father, the late Johnny Biggar, was a respected fiddler and played for dances in the area. His mother, the late Ruby Biggar, played mandolin, guitar, and some fiddle. Jackie's sister Anita was a fine piano player.

In his very early years,
Jackie was naturally curious about
the fiddle. He relates that as a small

boy he found a fiddle his father had been fixing and discovered that it rattled when he shook it. He couldn't find the cause for the noise so he took it to the chopping block by the woodpile and hit it with the axe. He discovered that the cause of the rattle was a small stick in the fiddle; he got his first look at a sound post.

Jackie always liked music. His first instrument was a mandolin. With the help of his mother he soon learned how to play Rubber Dolly. His father, understandably, was a bit wary of Jackie handling his fiddle. One day his mother told him to try it out but put it back the same way he found it. He started from there. The first tune he learned on the fiddle was Heather on the Hill. Jackie stated it was a popular tune then and most fiddlers played it and people liked to dance to it. Jackie credits his father for his style but he developed the "Scottish twist" by listening to the late Elmer Robinson. Other mentors he credits are the late Ervin Sonier, Dan MacCormack, Russell Warren and Bill Wagner. He especially admired the music of Winston Scotty Fitzgerald and later Buddy MacMaster, as well as a host of other Cape Breton Fiddlers. He went on to say that fiddle albums and tapes were scarce when he was a child. Tunes were learned by listening to other fiddlers. It was rare for fiddlers to read music.

A highlight of Jackie's early years occurred when he was 11 years old and was asked to play on a

radio program that featured local entertainers. It was called West Prince Party Line produced by then CJRW in Summerside.

Tyne Valley hosted Island fiddle and step dancing competitions for many years. Fiddlers and step dancers participated before a panel of three judges. Contestants were required to play a waltz or slow air, a jig and a reel. Jackie won the provincial championship in 1981, 1987 and 1988.

For about 5 years Jackie put his fiddle away, only playing on

rare occasions. One day he stopped by Ervin Sonier's barber shop in Summerside and Ervin played the Mug and Brush Reel that he had recently composed. Ervin handed Jackie his fiddle and asked Jackie to play it back for him. After Jackie played the tune, Ervin informed Jackie that there were some fiddle players practising locally called the Prince County Fiddlers and asked Jackie if he would like to participate. Jackie accepted the invitation and has been a valued member of the group ever since.

When asked what tunes are his favourites, he admits that he is partial to "anything Scottish". He enjoys playing in the key of A and B flat. His favourites vary from time to time. Currently, he has been playing a set of tunes consisting of the slow air Hector the Hero, Hills of Glengarry, 78 Highlanders, and Paddy on the Turnpike in A. He also enjoys playing the Twin Sisters, Brothers Letter and Pigeon on the Gate Post in the Cape Breton setting.

Jackie is more versatile than he readily admits. He can be heard playing many different tunes: waltzes, jigs, polkas, hornpipes and of course strathspeys.

This submission on Jackie Biggar was the product of a few hours spent with him at his home in Summerside. After the talking came the music. We played at least an hour's worth of tunes. What a great way to spend a February afternoon.

It is my pleasure to welcome you to another fine issue of The Island Fiddler, compliments of our editor and contributors. In our first newsletter of 2012, you will find details on many

exciting 'firsts' for our Society, happening this year.

The date has been set for our first Spring Concert in three years! On Sunday, May 6, the PEI Fiddlers Society will take the stage at the Carrefour Theatre in Charlottetown at 2:00pm. This will be the first time all four Chapters of the Society will be performing together. There will be special guest fiddlers, dancers, and pipers. Any and all fiddlers are welcome to join us for the finale and should contact Anne McPhee for tune details (687-1521). Watch the Guardian, The Buzz, and local media for ticket details.

It's also the first time that the money raised in the concert will go toward establishing fiddling scholarships for youth *Island-wide*. (These scholarships will be disbursed in addition to the Queens County Fiddler's annual scholarship which is awarded to a Queens County resident). Another first is the Fiddle Doo Down East and Potluck Supper being held on Saturday, May 26th at St. Mary's Hall in Souris from 2:00 - 7:00pm. This is a great opportunity to bring fiddlers together, from across PEI and New Brunswick, to share their love of the music. Admission is by donation with proceeds over and above expenses going to support fiddle related activities.

And finally, this year's PEI Fiddle Camp will be held in July for the first time. Moving to July will allow many school-aged youth and working adults to attend for their first time. Become a Part of Vishtèn Mosaïk

The traditional music group from P.E.I. and the Madeleine Islands, Vishtèn, is preparing to record their 4th album, Mosaïk. They are launching a "crowdfunding" campaign inviting the community to contribute in exchange for numerous rewards.

A new album has been an important goal of the band for the past few years and a lot of work has gone into researching, composing and arranging the music. The group received a grant from the Canada Council of the Arts, but the amount will not cover all the costs of the studio, mix, mastering, CD manufacturing and the promotional tools needed to make this album succeed on the market. The album is scheduled for release in the summer of 2012 but those who generously contribute will receive the album before it is shipped to stores.

Pastelle LeBlanc, of Vishtèn, explains the crowdfunding idea: "This is a way to help finance artistic projects without having to borrow money or depend on record labels. Since we've decided to produce the album ourselves, there are more risks, but also more liberty. Even more, this allows our fans, friends and family members to embark in this project and be part of this musical adventure with us!"

Numerous rewards are promised for those who will contribute and at different levels. In addition to receiving the digital and physical album before its release, they are also eligible to receive various promotion items; a new Vishtèn tune book, Skype lessons, a bodhran, recognition in the album credits, and a house concert!

Details are available at www.vishtenmusic.com. Fans will be able to follow the recording process with the group through a blog, as well as photos. The group is also launching a video describing this initiative and revealing a few samples from the album.

The heart of the project is a living and growing mosaïk that grows with the project. To recognize all you wonderful people who are supporting this music project, everyone has a little square. Since you're all important pieces of this project, you'll be able to see the heart flourish as the project moves forward!

With the worst of the cold winter days behind us, it means that we are moving ever closer to the nicer weather. And this means that concerts, festivals and lots of great


music and dancing are not far behind.



Bishop Faber MacDonald Jan 20, 1932 - Feb 17, 2012

On Feb 24th, along with hundreds of friends, family, clergy and community members, more than 35 members of the PEI Fiddlers Society gathered at the Basilica in Charlottetown to celebrate a life well lived and to bid a final farewell to Bishop Faber

MacDonald. It was a touching tribute to the "Fiddling Bishop", who began his quest to preserve and promote traditional Island music in 1976 at what was to become the first Rollo Bay Fiddle Festival.

A founding member of the PEI Fiddlers Society, the Bishop believed that music is a gift from a kind and loving God. Following a solo rendition of Hector the Hero, played by Natalie MacMaster, a large group of fiddlers that included Natalie, Richard Wood, the Chaissons, Father Charlie Cheverie and members of the Queens County Fiddlers played a medley of reels starting with Homeward Bound. With a send off like that, Bishop Faber is indeed, safely home.

fiddle workshop. Bertrand always delights his audiences with his lively style of fiddling.






