Kay MacKenzie - Still Playing for the Joy of the Music

Kay Mackenzie met recently when her caregiver Connie MacDougall called me to ask if I would come by Riverview Manor in Montague and tune Kay's violin for her. Kay had broken her hip and was in a wheelchair, but wanted to get back into playing her fiddle. I soon discovered that this cheerful bright-eved lady with the beautiful long fingers had an interesting story to tell of her early musical family learning to play the fiddle so

well that she was in demand to play for dances, which was quite unusual here for a woman in the 1930s and 40s.

Kay, one of four children, was born to Murdock and Mary Munroe of Lyndale, PEI in 1919. Her father was a farmer who did his plowing with horses and never did have a tractor. His brothers all left to work in Boston, so he was left with three farms to manage. Murdock was much in demand as a fiddler, and often after working hard all day, he would take his fiddle to dances in Lyndale, Valleyfield, Montague and Heatherdale. Kay's family often had house parties where fiddling was featured, and her sister Christina played the guitar and step-danced and her beloved brother George Robert Munroe was a lively step-dancer as well, before he died of scarlet fever at the age of three and a half.

Young Kay was very interested in learning to play the fiddle, but her father did not give her his fiddle to try out until one day when she was ten. Legend has it that she started out to learn "Darling Nelly Grey" by ear from memory, and by the end of that day, she had the tune down. The family soon realized that they had another fiddler on their hands, and Kay often accompanied her father to the dances and she eventually gained a reputation of being as good a fiddler as her father. She also learned to play the guitar and

has many old photos of her accompanying various fiddlers at the house parties. She still has her \$9 guitar bought second-hand in Charlottetown many years ago, and it still is tunable despite never having been kept in a case! (This proves they don't make them like they used to!) Her dear nephew Gerry McCarty has provided now the Yamaha with a sturdy case.

Kay has many fond memories of the dances and recalls, with a twinkle in her eyes, the dancing of some

of the "nice-looking" fellows of the era. She remembers Alec "Thresher" MacLeod, (so known because he owned a threshing machine) as a very good step-dancer who knew a variety of fancy steps and loved to step-dance all around the hall. Billy Troy was another lively dancer, and of course she remembers the dashing and talented O'Connor brothers; Emerson, Attwood and Newton from Milltown Cross, who were from a very musical family as well.

As well as working at the Ferguson Shipyard in Pictou, Nova Scotia during World War II, Kay worked as a maid and cook for several wealthy families in

Beverley, Massachusets. One day, she just couldn't resist playing a violin she found upstairs in one of the homes she was working in. Kay overheard by the lady of house and this eventually led to her being given the instrument which she still has today. (Fortunately it does have a case!)

Kay played at many gatherings of Islanders and other Maritimers in the States, often with her sister. She would always return home in the summers to help her father with the farming. In her late thirties, she married Lincoln MacKenzie, a retired Presbyterian Minister, whom she met at a dance at Valleyfield Hall. After their marriage, they moved to his family home in Seal River.

Last month, we got Kay's guitar and fiddle tuned up and we had a bit of a jam session at the Manor. Wayne MacLean dropped by to try out the guitar, and Kay's nimble fingers zipped through one tune after another, her feet dancing away on the wheelchair all the while, and then she would pause and say with a big grin," I played that too fast, I need to practice more often!" She has some old Scottish songs in her repertoire, including an old drinking song, published in 1911 called "Wee Deoch an' Doris", versions of popular songs of years gone by such as "Nobody's Darling but Mine", "Pigs in the Parlour" (or "Bear went over the Mountain"), "The Bull kicked Daddy", "Mrs. MacCarthy do you have a daughter" and many others. She lit into "Little Brown Jug" in G so fast that I was left in the dust, being used to a version in D played more slowly by my fiddle students! She plays "St. Anne's Reel" of course, and recalls that "Lord MacDonald's Reel" was often played for the dances. She enjoys hearing it again whenever I play it for her, and she always lights up when her caregiver, Connie, step-dances to the "Irish Washerwoman".

Her family's love of music and encouragement of their children to learn instruments and dance has stayed with her and given her great joy all her life. Only a chosen few of us are able to boast that we have played the fiddle for 83 years!

It's been a busy fall season of music in Eastern Kings with no sign of slowing down as we move into the Christmas season.


The Rollo Bay Fiddle classes began as usual on the Monday

Fall has been fun for our group. We challenged ourselves to play 9 tunes with harmony at Sturgeon Ceilidh October 21st. Four members played the harmony parts and the rest (14) played the main parts. Gary Hughes

accompanied us on piano with Margie Carmichael on octave mandolin and Wayne MacLean on guitar, so we all made quite a racket, a pleasant one by all accounts. For the first tune, Da Slockitt Light, we were led by Harrison Klein, age 6, on his 1/8 sized fiddle. He played along with us very well, but at his next lesson, he pointed to the two measures where he lost his place "because I started listening to the harmony". I don't think he is the first one to have ever done that!

We are working on some new tunes with a view to playing again next July at Rollo Bay, and are getting transcriptions made of some tunes on Kinnon Beaton's latest and wonderful CD, Tunesmiths (available from daughter Andrea's website). One of my students found a great tune from Kinnon, a delicious slow air called Jane Andrews (on the Failte Airs and Waltzes CD) – we hope to learn that one too. Our member Hughie Jackson recorded a lovely, previously unwritten waltz – the Pictou County Waltz – and Cindy Bell graciously wrote it down for us. It is about 40 years old and is becoming a favorite tune. We don't know who composed that one.

On November 19, Sheila Fitzpatrick has agreed to give us a workshop, and Richard Wood will be teaching us some time in the early spring when he gets a bit of a break from touring. In December, we have a practice on Dec 10 at Gillis Lodge and hope to play again at Perrin's Villa so that our most senior



member, Ambrose Casey, can join us for a tune or two.

In January the fiddlers will continue practices in Montague at the Active Communities Rural Development building at Brooke and Main on alternate Monday nights. (For information call Urban Chaisson at 962-3865, visitors are welcome.) I will be teaching Community School violin classes for beginners and more advanced at Murray Harbour on Monday nights from January to mid-March. Over the past 14 years that I have been leading that class, I have made many friends and musical companions and look forward to seeing them again in the New Year.
